#### I. Title of the practice :

1. Extension Activity: Toilet construction to avoid Open Defecation as a part of Swachha Bharath Abhiyaan in Halyal Village of Hubballi Taluka.

#### 2. Goal :-

- Put an end to unhealthy practice of open defecation.
- Awareness of health, hygiene and ecological balance among the rural masses.
- Cultivate the spirit of active involvement in community services amongst stakeholders.

3. Context: - In the wake of globalization and the rapid changes in the lifestyle of the people across the globe certain basic globally acceptable social etiquettes need to be practiced by people at large. In the context of lifestyle issues like global warming and rising pollution in every aspect of life, the need to educate the rural population about the health benefits of following certain manners and social behavioural patterns is the need of the hour.

College NSS unit has taken interest in bringing about a healthy change in the life of the people of **Halyal, a village in Hubballi Taluka**. 50 of our NSS volunteers with support of Gram Panchayat, of Halyal village and Zilla Panchayat, Dharwad and Local NGO's have successfully built **85 toilet blocks** and motivated the people to stop open defecation and use the toilets.

4. **Practice:-** The practice of using toilets ensures safety and upholds the dignity of the women folk. It is a step towards providing sanitation facility and thereby ensuring security to young, adolescent girls. The toilets help them to maintain their menstrual hygiene and also serve as a means of lowering the risk of harassment when defecating in the open at the odd hours of dawn and dusk.
5. **Evidence of Success:-** The people of Halyal village are grateful to our NSS volunteers who constructed the toilet blocks with assistance from the masons. They happily announced that by the end of the year they would construct a few more toilet blocks so that their village can be declared as **open defecation free village** with the support of the government, the gram panchayat and zilla panchayat.
6. **Problems Encountered & Resources Required:-** The rural mass are not open to the idea of using toilets for various reasons. The convenience of open defecation, expenditure involved in the construction of toilets, availability of suitable place to construct toilets at home and the age old, traditional belief that toilets should be far away from the residential quarters were some of the problems that need to be addressed. Convincing the villagers is the major problem. Open defecation poses health problems like diarrhoea and viral diseases and the infant children are the worst affected. Creating awareness about these issues among the villagers is the main step towards open defecation free village. Finance mobilization is a major problem as the fund provided by the government is meagre. So the public and NGO's should come forward to put an end to this disgraceful social practice of open defecation.

This Best practice is unique and novel and hope that it will be appreciated by all. This is a challenging task that requires time, energy and funds.

### 1. Title of the practice:

**Initiative towards Conducting Practical Examination in Computer Applications in Business by inviting External Examiners.**

### 2. Goal:

The college was established with a clear Vision, Mission and Objective of impacting quality education and focusing on overall personality development of students'. As a result, it has achieved many milestones and set a bench mark in curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities by grabbing ranks at the university level and having university blues continuously since its inception. This clearly indicates the concern of the college towards fulfilment of its objectives.

The Department of Computer Science has initiated a unique practice to conduct practical examination with the external examiners in the subject Computer Applications in Business. The objective of the practice is to bring transparency and to create awareness amongst students' about the importance of practical knowledge and to cultivate the habit of continuous involvement of students' in learning process and to enhance their computer application skills in various functional areas of business.

### 3. The context:

Karnatak University has introduced Computer Applications in Business as a core subject for B.Com course i.e., II semester to VI Semester from the academic year 2000-2001, in which both theoretical and practical aspects are taught in 4 hrs and 2 hrs respectively per week. Both theory and practical examinations are conducted at the end of every semester. However, theory examination is conducted by the University and practical examination is conducted by the faculty of the college. Hence, student's give more importance for theoretical aspects of the paper rather than giving equal importance to both. We have noticed the same and to bring the change in the mind set of students' by introducing the practice of inviting external examiners for conducting practical examination in the subject. Though the University does not insist on inviting external examiners to conduct practical examination in the subjects like Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany etc., the institution has taken initiative to invite external examiners from other colleges to conduct practical exams. It means additional expenditure has to be incurred by the college. But to sustain quality and impart skill, the college has introduced this novel system for the last 3 years. It helps in developing in application skills and making them employable in the competitive world.

### 4. The Practice:

The college undertakes various novel initiatives like:

- Our college is the only college among the colleges affiliated to the Karnatak University Dharwad, which has the practice of conducting practical examination for commerce students by external examiners.

- This Best Practice of inviting external teachers from other reputed colleges affiliated to the Karnatak University Dharwad as external examiners, which was started from the academic year 2015-16.
- Practical exams are being conducted at the end of every semester and the external examiners are given the responsibility to set the practical examination questions and conduct viva like in Science stream.
- Batches of 20 students each are made, so that the examiners can assess each student thoroughly by practical exam and viva.

5. **Evidence of success:**

- Students' started evincing interest in the subject.
- They realised the importance of practical sessions apart from theory sessions and started attending practical sessions to enhance their knowledge.
- They started keeping the Lab manuals updated as per the requirements.
- Impressive result in the subject.

6. **Problems encountered and resources required:**

- Teething resistance from students' for the practical exams since Karnatak University Dharwad has not made practical exams compulsory for B.Com. Course.
- Budgetary provision is made in the beginning to conduct practical examination.
- Technical and non-technical support is provided by the college.
